Featured This Edition

Tom Rudder, Virginia Bennett, Kris Adcock, and Patty Knutson provide more information and more clues to the Origins of the Jessee Family in America.

Pam Kipphut, James Birkholz, and John Jacoby provide evidence to the French and German origins of several Jesse and Jessie families in America.

Tom Rudder and Vivian Bales provide more specific information regarding the John and Frankey Lea Jessee family. **Rev. Vernon Cecil Jessee and Henry A. "Hank" Davis, Jr.** restimulate efforts to save the cemetery where John and Frankey Jessee are buried, and again propose we establish a memorial.

The status of research on each of John and Frankey's fifteen children is reviewed. Many have made significant contributions extending our knowledge of their descendants. In particular, **Janet Lee Lighthill Ridley** has contributed over 1000 new descendants of Archer Jessee. The research team of **Jack Hockett, Kathryn Burke Greever, and Imogene Burke Verbal** may have doubled that number with extensive new information regarding the descendants of the Burke family, who married two children and two grandchildren of John and Frankey Jessee.

Correspondence includes many letters correcting errors, providing new information and, of course, new problems and mysteries to solve. One tidbit from **Nellie Ruth Rasnake Jessee** provides information that my wife **Nelda Meline Jessee** is not only cousin to any George Lea Jessee descendants, but is a cousin to some descendants of Phillip and Gabriel Jessee, too.

The 1998 Honor Roll of Donors who sustain this effort concludes the newsletter.

Origins of The Jesse(e) Family

There are many Jessee, Jesse, even Jessie families in the United States and Canada that we know are descended from families whose American origins are in Virginia. There are many Jesse, Jessee, Jessie, Jessey and, perhaps, Jaci, Jacy, and Jacie families in the world whose kinship is unknown. I believe we are all cousins and welcome you. As "Jesse" and "Jessee" are the two most frequent spellings of this family name, I shall adopt the convention of using "Jesse(e)" in reference to the larger family.

Please see Newsletter #10 for an extensive discussion and summary of what we know so far about the origins of the Jesse(e) families in America. The many clues there lead us to several new avenues of research on the origins of the Jesse(e) families in, at least, Amelia Co., Cumberland Co., Essex Co., Isle of Wight Co., King and Queen Co., King William Co., Lancaster Co., Middlesex Co., and Spotsylvania Co., VA, just to start. Here are more clues.

Tom Rudder has discovered evidence of a **Thomas Jessee** who was transported to Maryland in 1671. This is from *Early Settlers of Maryland* by Gust Skordas, which provides the file and folio numbers as Tom explains. "The importation of Thomas Jessee is covered in the Records of Land Patents, Liber 16 (vol. 16) Folio 170. It is in the Hall of Records (Archives), Annapolis, Maryland."

Tom furthers his case that Jessee, with a double "e", was the original spelling when our family arrived in America. "It's ironic that the only two recorded arrivals in America, that I have found, were both Jessees."

In a separate note Tom responds to a conjecture about **Lazarus Jessee**, who was discussed in Newsletter 13.

It's true that the name Lazarus was not used in the John Jessee family, but I suspect that the Lazarus and Jane Jessee (in Adair Co., KY ca. 1800) mentioned by Jack Martin were somehow connected to the William [actually Thomas] Jessee who was born in Amelia Co., VA and moved to Adair Co., KY after the Revolutionary War. .

Tom adds the following with attached 1820, 1830, and 1840 Adair Co., KY Census abstracts, and a copy of a page from the Rev. War Pension Files for documentation.

I think I told you that William Jessee went to Adair Co. Ky. It was Thomas Jessee. After looking at the 1820-40 Adair Co. census data, it is my guess that Lazarus Jessee was the father of Jane, who married in 1816. In 1820 Lazarus had a daughter over age 16. He also had a son over 16. This indicates that he had children prior to his marriage to Sarah Sparks in 1806. The census reflects that he was born between 1775 and 1780 and would have been between 36 and 40 years old in 1816 when Jane married. He was not likely an older brother. No other Lazarus Jessee appears in the 1820-40 census. The other possibility would be Thomas Jessee, but then he was not at the wedding.

And now the mystery! The Rev. War Veteran Thomas Jessee (born in 1754, see attached Rev. War Pension Files) moved to Adair Co., KY in 1815 but does not appear in the 1820-30 census, even though he applied for a pension from there in 1838. In 1830 he would have been 76 years old. The Thomas Jessee listed in the 1830 census was 50 to 60 years old. Explain that!

In any event I think they were all descendants of Lazarus Jessee who came to Amelia Co. in 1730/40.

And just to tantalize us, Virginia provides a clue regarding the Lea family of America.

From *New England Chronicle, News of New England from January 1722-December 1731*, by Armand Francis Lucier, Heritage Books, in the chapter "1726" p. 83.

Boston, Jan. 8. · On Wednesday the 5th Instant, the *Swallow* Briganteen from Barbadoes, **William Lea** Master, was cast away near Deer-Island, Five of the Company were drowned, and the Master and one more savâd.

Kris Adcock (capkrew@fgi.net) posted this inquiry on JESSEE-L@ rootsweb.com.

Iâm searching for information about **Mary JESSE**, probably the daughter of **Walter Jesse**. I donât have exact dates to go on. Walter Jesse died about 1752 in Chester, PA. Mary married Edward Goff. They had a daughter Frances "Fannie" GOFF b. in Chester, PA, m. 10 APR 1769 in Lancaster Co., PA, d. in Nelson Co., KY.

I would love to hear from anyone with possible connections to this family! Thanks for your time and help.

Patty Jesse Knutson provides another important clue to the origins of the various Jesse(e) families in America in an e-mail, 11/10/1998 (Patty.Knutson@SDInc.com).

Hi Jim,

I came across your site through Ancestry.com. My maiden name is JESSE, although I have seen my line listed in the 1850 Kentucky census as JESSEE.

Iâm trying to find information on my great-great-great-grandfather, **Samuel Jesse**. He was married in Lancaster County, VA in 1793 to Catherine George and moved with an unnamed brother to Woodford County, KY in 1813. Iâm trying to find out the brotherâs name and his parentâs names. According to some information that I have, Samuel was born in the Shenandoah Valley, VA.

I have learned along the way the JESSE is possibly a French surname, coming from a town called Jessy in Normandie, France. Is this your understanding also?

I would appreciate if you could contact me if any of this ties in with your JESSEE line.

The relationship of this Samuel Jesse to John and Frankey Jessee is unknown, but this may provide a clue to common origins for both families. I speculate that, because of the spelling and occurrence of the name Samuel, her Samuel Jesse may be related to the **John Jesse** born 1769 in Cumberland, Co., VA, who died about 1808. He was the subject of prior newsletters and the book *The Jesses-1601-1928*, prepared by J. S. Jesse, who had children: **John P. Jesse**, b. 1789, **Thomas Hall Jesse**, b 11 Dec 1791, **William Morgan Jesse**, b. 1798, and **Samuel Jesse**, b. 1800, all in Cumberland Co., VA.

That Jesse(e) is of French origin is a persistent speculation and, as we see in the following correspondence, a case can be made for the German origin of the surname, Jesse, as well.

Pam Kipphut (kipcrew@frontiernet.net) provided via e-mail, 11/3/1998, the following:

"My **JESSEs** (and yes, that IS the spelling) are directly from Germany to the Rochester, NY and Gibson, PA areas.

My g-grandfather was **Heinrich Carl Friedrich Wilhelm JESSE** (went by Henry Carl Jesse here in the States). He was born 30 Nov 1864 to **Johann Christian Martin JESSE** (a brick mason) and **Frederika Louise Maria Wilhelmina MILDAHN** in Sulz, Mecklenberg, Germany. Johann was born in Sulz, Mecklenberg, Germany· the illegitimate son of **Anna Sophie Katharina JESSE** who later married and became GRIMM/GRAHM. Frederika was born 3 Jan 1835 in Marlow, Mecklenberg, Germany· the daughter of John MILDAHN. They were married 1 Sep 1856 in Marlow. They both died and are buried in Gibson, PA. We have no information as to when they immigrated to the USA and cannot figure out yet whether they went to PA from Rochester area or if their son Henry just immigrated later and chose to go to Rochester, NY, rather than to PA.

We do know that **Henry Carl JESSE** emigrated to NY 20 Nov 1885. He married **Caroline Luise Joachime HAENSEL** on 25 Aug 1886. Caroline was born 15 JUL 1865 in Altenwillershagen, Pommern, Germany. Henry was naturalized 2 Mar 1903 in Monroe Co., NY. Their family home(s) are still in the town of Fairport, just outside Rochester, NY though they also lived in neighboring Manchester, Macedon, and Mendon, NY. Henry died 24 Feb 1950 in Fairport, and Caroline died 12 Apr 1945.

I know the spelling of JESSE to be correct as I have the original document in German giving Henry permission to emigrate to "Amerika" at 20 years of age from Sulz dated 14 Sep 1885 in Schwerin with the seal and all. The name is spelled "Jes°e" with the "°" being the German symbol for the double "s"..or so I have been told.

We would love to have additional information of any connection made to this line so I have elaborated with the hope that · this may ring a bell with someone. Thank you,

James Birkholz (birchwd@connect.net) wrote, October 8, 1998, "Iâm assuming that most Jesse surnames are Anglo, but I have a German Jesse ancestor. It is possible that it is a variant of **Güse/Güsse/Guse**. **Martin Birkholz** married **Anna Elisabeth Jesse**, 17 Jan 1837." James provides their six children, all of whom are born in Sypniewo, "a hamlet in Kreis Kolmar in the Prussian Province of Posen, later germanized to Seeort."

And if that is not enough, here is another possible **Jessie** family of German origin.

John C. Jacoby e-mailed [callie@anet.com] me with the following information and inquiry.

November 26 and 30, 1998

Good Morning,

Iâm tracing the Jessie line in and around Jackson and Monroe Counties in Wisconsin. Have you encountered any of these Jessies? They seem to have no connection any other group. They were all farmers and reluctant to discuss family history. My mother is the last of the line. She is 94 and in failing health. She thinks the family emigrated from Germany about

1880-1890, and changed their name to Jessie from some other soundex equivalent, related surnames are Schmidt and Albrecht. ·

These people comprise 50% of my heritage, and I have less than 5% of my GEDCOM [genealogy data] devoted to their line. They were devout Lutherans, hard working farmers, and patriarchal. Brandenburg, Prussia is rumored to be the origin of some. Here is the best information I have. Some of it may be erroneous.

John and Frankey Lea Jessee

Many Jessees in America are descended from **John (1750-1815)** and **Frankey Lea Jessee (1752/61-1836)** of Cobb's Creek, Caswell County, North Carolina and Carr's Creek (today Mill Creek) in Reed's Valley, Russell County, Virginia. They had fifteen children. There are many "Jessee," "Jesse," even "Jessie" families in the United States and Canada who are known descendants of those fifteen children. All of us living descendants, including most of the subscribers to this newsletter, are about fifth or sixth cousins, or even closer kin.

From time to time, it was my intention to provide a new listing of the first three or four generations of their descendants. However, I find that, with my extensive notations and source references included, it has grown too large for mass printing in the Newsletter. Therefore and instead, I will continue to report new research with respect to each of their fifteen (I-XV) children in the Newsletter, and rely upon special requests and the new Jessee Family Website to provide the detailed genealogy information to those specifically interested in any particular branch. For those who provide me a donation in 1999 and request a new listing, I will reward you with one by return mail. Contributors may also request descendants or pedigree charts of anyone mentioned in this newsletter.

Tom and Shirley Rudder steadily add to our knowledge and understanding of John and Frankey's family, helping to trace their descendants through Census and other records. Tom has been studying the 1830 Russell Co., VA Census, trying to identify heads of households and their children, who are only indicated by age category in that Census. He is trying to help us figure out who is Joseph Jessee who appears in the 1850 Floyd Co., KY Census, but would have been "under 5" in the 1830 Census. He specifically examined and attempts to identify the Jessee heads of household and their male children under 5, and offers the following analysis and questions. Corrections welcome.

Tom offers advice on the sometimes wide differences in ages, not to mention spelling of names, found in the various census records for the same person. "You look in a lot of censuses, you notice a lot of difference in ages."

Vivian Bales provided the following transcription of the settlement of the John Jessee estate as recorded in Russell County Will Book 3, page 249, that gives us insight into his life.

Settlement of the Estate of John Jessee

Pursuant to an order of the worshipful court of Russell Co., Nov term 1817 to us directed we have met with Archibald Jessee and Lee Jessee Admrs. of John Jessee deceased and brought them together to a settlement according to the following bill:

Rev. Vernon Cecil Jessee writes to correct some information in the last newsletter and to restimulate efforts to **rescue the cemetery where John and Frankey are buried and to establish a memorial park.**

June 23, 1998

Dear Jim,

I was thinking of the property in Reeds Valley, Russell Co., VA where John and Frankey Lea Jessee are buried, and where T. J. Jessee, wife Sarah Browning, possibly George Lea, and wife "Betsy" Counts, my great grandparents are buried. If I am not mistaken that cemetery is called the George Lea Jessee Cemetery. I know that Sarah Browning, and T. J. Jessee's 2nd wife, Nannie B. Candler, are buried there because my daughter and I were there in March, and found their markers. We had to clean them off enough to take pictures, the markers were lying on the ground. No fence around the gravesites and cattle had been tromping across it. It's a terrible feeling when you see the disrespect for a burial ground like that. We found no other markers of the Jessees, nor did we find a marker for the Bransons.

Now for my idea. I thought that if enough of the Jessees across the country could come together and contribute two or three hundred dollars each and accumulate enough money to offer a price (that the person who owns that land couldn't afford to turn down), then we could purchase about three acres, including the cemetery. We could put up a building, with restrooms, parking lot, and space for people to park RVs. Put up a memorial like was planned before, and have a Jessee reunion for one week each year. During the rest of the time we could rent out to others that would be interested having a reunion. We could get someone to watch after the place, etc. I have a lot more thoughts concerning this, but I thought that I would drop this your way to see what you would think, along that line. .

PS: My daughter and I visited several Jessee cemeteries in Reeds Valley. **Harold Dickenson** showed us where they were. We saw Archer Jessee's marker, Joseph and Cynthia Smith Jessee's markers, also Ephraim Jessee's. I think maybe

if we could have turned a big Jessee tombstone over, it could have been John Jessee, Jr. It was in the same cemetery with Joseph, Cynthia, and Ephraim. [John Jessee, Jr., Joseph, and Ephraim's brother, John Tivis Jessee is the editor's direct line, and I was unable to find this cemetery in my three visits there-I should have found Harold Dickenson!] . I held a revival meeting nightly from the 7th of June thru the 13th at Coeburn, VA (Wise Co.). Met some folks that were descendants of the Jessees -one was **Beulah Bradly**, from Castlewood, and **Bernice Hurd** from Nicklesville.

Tom Rudder and I promoted, solicited donations, and established a memorial fund, and more in earlier newsletters. We did get a few contributions and offers to help with the physical work, but failed to get sufficient interest in Russell Co. and absolutely no response from the current owner of this land, Mr. Jimmy Herndon. We closed the fund and returned the money. Many across this country are still willing to make contributions, but we need a really big donor, and, more importantly, leadership in Russell County to make this happen. I believe this should be a Russell County Chamber of Commerce economic development project, which could include purchasing the Jessee Mill, the Thomas Jefferson Jessee Home, and this cemetery. All are adjacent to each other, and would make a wonderful County Park and Picnic Grounds, and site to host family reunions from all over the country, including that RV parking.

I. John Jessee, Jr.

John Jessee, Jr. (1775-1834) married **Mary "Polly" Armstrong** (1780-1840) and they had six children. This is the editor's line.

Dennie Hall of Douglasville, GA (hallr@avana.net) is a descendant of John Jr. via his son **Archer** and **Eleanor Smith Jessee**, and their son **Andrew Jackson** and **Rachel McKinney Jessee**, who moved to Carter Co., KY. He provides the following.

Hey Cousin Jim,

How are you doinâ, found something interesting. Take a look at the 2 attachments to this e-mail. I think the obit is for Jack Jessee of Mill Creek, son of Arch Jessee and Mary Owens. The other is a bitmap of the Death Certificate of Andrew Jackson Jessee, B. 2-24-1830, Woodford, KY, d. 1914, Confederate Home Infirmary, Oldham Co., KY. The copy shows his father was Wash Jessee, b. VA and mother, Anna Jessee, B. VA Who is he/they? He has the approx. birthdate of my A. J. Jessee, but I donât think they are the same people.

I was back home in Carter Co. during spring break. Visited some old cemeteries, one of which was the old Dan Jessee Cem. where Eleanor, Dan and Dan's 2nd wife, Nancy Counts, are buried. Among the 2 dozen or so graves there, these 3 and one for a Lark Ray, d. 1933 are the only ones with markers that are inscribed. There is another cemetery across Tygart's Creek (Jessee's Ford) that I will investigate this summer. Iâm trying to find the grave of Andrew Jackson Jessee, son of Arch and Eleanor Smith Jessee. Jack, as he was called, was living with his son, Robert at Counts Crossroads, Carter Co., in 1900. .

Obituary of Andrew Jackson Jessee

May 26, 1922

A. J. Jessee, farmer and successful businessman, died Sunday afternoon at his home at Jessee's Mill, Russell County, following an illness of several weeks. Mr. Jessee, 83 years, 8 months and 7 days of age, was a remarkable man in many respects—his memory being perfect and he was all business until the day before his death. If anyone wanted to know what the cattle market was on any day a year back, Mr. Jessee could give it to them in a flash from memory. He had been so wise in the management of his affairs that he had accumulated a big estate which will be shared by his three children, Mrs. T. L. Bundy, Mr. Wiley Jessee, of Russell and Mr. Ed Jessee of Missouri and the widow who survived him. The deceased fought on the Confederate side during the Civil War and was a fine soldier, participating in many battles.

II. Archer Jessee

Archer Jessee (1776-1862) married three times: **Nancy Browning** (1781-1826); **Rachel Herndon** (1790-1833); and **Mary Jane "Polly" Owens** (1803-1884) and had fifteen children.

Janet Lee Lighthill Ridley, a newcomer to our newsletter, has provided over 1000 descendants of Archer Jessee and Nancy Browning, via their daughter, **Elizabeth Jessee** (1806-1848) who married **Francis Howard** (1805-1848). A snippet of her narrative, data, and sources is included on the following pages. I am grateful Janet provided this substantial contribution of new descendants of John and Frankey Lea Jessee, and that she has allowed me to share her data with other researchers. Perhaps readers can help us determine the pedigree of **Larkin Howard** and **Rachel Herndon** as small thanks to Janet.

Helen Runyan Perkins, in continuing correspondence over some years, and, more recently, **Paul Escarraz** (escarraz@fgi.net), have both greatly extended information regarding the descendants of their ancestor **Laura Jane Jessee** who married **Jehu Runyan**. Laura Jane Jessee is a daughter of **David Hanson Jessee**, son of **John Jessee**, son of **Archer Jessee**.

Helen Runyan Perkins is perplexed by a research problem and asks for help. Her mother's family spell their name Barracks. She believes this was a deliberate variation made by either her grandfather or g-grandfather on its original spelling of Barrick. Helen's grandfather, **William B. Barracks**, and her g-grandfather **Jacob Barracks** lived in Tuscola, Douglas Co., IL. My paternal grandmother is a descendant of **Peter Phillip Barrick** (which is a derivative of the German Berg who arrived in Maryland about 1710). The family settled in Crawford Co., IL early in the 1800s. Helen and I believe we must be related through this Barrick line, as well as through the Jessees, but we cannot connect her grandfather to the Douglas Co, IL Barrick family.

I have discovered a problem in the data base that needs a solution. First the facts.

Dave Gilliam posted this information that agrees with my recorded data on this family.

I show **Kemper Gilmer Jessee** (3/23/1903-11/1987) married to **Laura Belle Buckles** (1906-?) in 1925, Russell County, VA. I show their children as:

I have two Kemper Gilmer Jessees, both born in 1903/04, with different pedigrees. Each are descendants of Archer Jessee via different sons. Kemper Gilmer #1 is the son of **Edward Thomas Jessee**, son of **William Jr.**, son of **William Sr.**, son of Archer. Kemper Gilmer #2 is the son of **Winfield Scott Jessee** (who married **Bertha L. Gilmore**) son of **Vincent Jr.**, son of **Vincent Sr.**, son of Archer Jessee. This Kemper Gilmer #2 is also a descendant of **John Jessee Jr.** via a daughter of **Joseph Jessee**, **Mary Elizabeth Jessee** who married **Daugherty Gilmer**. Can anyone straighten me out?

III. William Jessee

William Jessee (1779-1841) married **Mary "Polly" Vermillion** (1785-1879) and they had fourteen children. This family moved to Lee Co., VA.

Sharlene Boyer and cousin, **Dan H. LeVan, Jr.**, have provided photos, marvelous stories, maps, and other materials regarding **Elisha Bishop Jessee**, which I will feature in a future newsletter. Elisha Bishop Jessee was the son of Oliver Jessee, a son of William and Mary Vermillion Jessee.

IV. Lea Jessee

Lea Jessee (1781-1852) married **Barbara Gose** (1788-1862), da. of **Stephen Gose** and **Barbara Catron Gose**, and they had ten children. This family moved to Missouri.

V. David Jessee

Reverend David Jessee (1783-1856) married **Catherine "Katie" Banner** (1788-1860) and had thirteen children.

Kathryn Greever, with a little assist from **Michael Dye**, has provided the definitive evidence that David's son, **Stephen G. Jessee** married **Rebecca Jessee**, not **Rebecca Lee** with the following material taken from her manuscript on the Vermillion family genealogy. Please see the discussion under Rebecca Jessee Burk below.

"On Jan. 30, 1851, Rebecca Vermillion married Stephen G. Jessee, born ca. 1824, Copper Creek."

Taken from *Lost Marriage Records of Russell Co., VA 1848-1853*, by Michael Dye.

Some researchers have reported that Stephen G. Jessee married a Rebecca Lee; however, Rebecca Vermillion Jessee is referred to as Rebecca Jessee in her father's will--substantiating that she did indeed marry a Jessee. The 1860 Russell Co. Census, household 1229, contained Jessee (age 72) and Nancy (age 69) Vermillion. Next door, in household 1230 is Stephen G. Jesse (sic) and Rebecca. . Stephen G. Jessee was a soldier in the 22nd VA Cavalry, CSA, Summer 1863 (Southwest Virginia Ancestors, Vol. 6, No. 2, Summer 1992 and Vol. 8, No. 2, Summer 1994). From 1860 Census, she is 34 and Stephen is 36. On the 1870 Russell Co., Census their ages are both listed at 44. On the 1880 Bedford Co., TN Census (Dist. 6, HH 192) Stephen Jessee (sic) is 53, born VA, parents born VA; Rebecca 52. (Note: This family does not show up on the 1900 TN SDX) Stephen does not show up on tax lists, since men over age 50 did not have to pay poll taxes in TN based on an 1873 law providing exemption and Stephen would have been 50 in ca. 1874. Also , Stephen did not apply for a CSA pension in TN, and he did not own property in Bedford Co., TN. I suspect he died before 1900.

Robin Dea Clay Oliver, ggggg-graunddaughter of David Jessee, via his daughter **Nancy Ann Jessee** who married **Fleming Burk, Jr.**, has provided us information for well over 100 descendants of Nancy Ann Jessee. I still need to key in this information, and I will be sharing it with Kathryn Greever, too, as it extends both the Jessee and Burk family data.

Source: Material provided by Janet Lee Lighthill (ib3657j@juno.com) via e-mail, 9/23/1998 details over 1000 descendants of Elizabeth Jessee and Francis Howard through two lines, that of Nancy Browning Howard, who married Wesley Cartwright, and Rachel Howard, who married James Brown Kelley. Her data and notes follow.

The source of most of my information on the Francis Howard family is a book, "Johnston of Caroline County, Virginia--Some of the Descendants of William and Ann Chew Johnston (1647-1778)" compiled by Elbert Felton Johnston, Ph.D., Gateway Press, Inc., Baltimore, 1980. There is a Howard Family Graveyard four miles north of Jamestown, in Boone County, IN. Francis Howard, Elizabeth Jessee Howard, and three of their daughters, Margaret Nash Howard, Mary Jane Howard, and Dicey Howard are all five buried there, and the markers say (d.) 1848. In the Indiana Census for 1850, Elizabeth Jessee Howard does not appear. Two of her children, Rachel Howard (my g-g-grandmother) who is 15 years old, and her brother Henry, who is 10, are both on the census. They are both living in the household of William W. Brown, age 26, in Montgomery County. Two weeks later, Rachel turns up alone in the household of William H. Williamson and family back in Boone County. I think that if there was a Will Ferguson married to an Elizabeth Jessee, it must have been another Elizabeth. I'm told Elizabeth Howard left a will in Boone Co., IN in 1848. I have Rachel Howard and James Brown Kelley's marriage license and a copy of their obituaries which appeared in the Van Wert, IA newspaper.

Rachel married (MRIN:7072) James Brown KELLEY-20152 on 29 Jan 1851 in Montgomery Co., IN. James was born 21 Oct 1819 in Perry, Kentucky. He died 4 Oct 1909 in Van Wert, Iowa.

He lived in Perry County KY until about 1830, then moved with his parents to Montgomery Co, IN with his parents. He moved to Boone County, IN about 1851 where he stayed until he migrated to Marion County, IA about 1855 where he was "engaged in mercantile pursuits" until 1859 when he moved to Clarke County, IA where he had a 264-acre farm west and 1/2 mi south of Green Bay, IA.

He was a JP for 6 years, a township assessor for 2 terms, and a member of the school board. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge and especially active in the Methodist Church in Green Bay.

I have a copy of a hymn he wrote entitled "The Great God of Love."

She constantly works at ferreting out little bits and pieces of information she gathered over a lifetime, and sends them my way. I attempt to keep up with her by keying her information into the database. Here she provides some good advice, with more memories, stories, and insights into her colorful life.

Dear Jim Jessee,

See the enclosed pages [412 thru 425] from Harman's book the *Annals of Tazewell County, Virginia*. The original was copyrighted 1923 by John Newton Harman. It was recopyrighted by Netti Schreiner Yantis in 1975. [An excellent resource for the **GOSE** family]

My Grandma Dickison was Melvina Kiser, dau. of Hugh and his wife Levicey McKinney. She said that when people came over from VA, they came in groups, sometimes several families. She said when they got to the area where their old friends and relatives had settled in the country, others took them in, until they could settle or find a place of their own. She said it was like old hometown jubilee, welcoming and accepting their old neighbors and friends and relatives.

Far fetched from today. We are a fragmented society. No real true friends. The word friend does not mean what it did 150 years ago. In Aug. this year, my daughter went down to Ashland, KY and took me along of course, to a Dickison reunion. Then we went over into Carter Co. The old landmarks have mostly been destroyed. And they have roads now where as a child was a foot of a huge hill or mountain, and small winding roads. Now they have bulldozed the mountains and built big paved roads. If they want a road to where ever, they bulldoze and level and build a road.

We went to a cemetery that was known as the McKinney Cemetery for a century and more, now called Mountain View. I thought we would never get there. The road was like a spiral. This way, that way, up and down and sharp curves and dips. Finally made it right to the top. And the cemetery, what is left of it, is a little clearing right at the edge of the road. My Grandma Dickison and her daughter Mary are buried there as well as some of the McKinneys.

· Below the cemetery was [a place] called Corea Switch. The railroad went up that mountain. Even with just a little load, one engine would not pull the load to the top of the mountain, so they used two engines to the top, and unhooked one, and the train went on to its destination, and the extra went back down the hill to wait for the next train. This was near

Grahn. Was a mountain either way, but going from Olive Hill to the mountain cemetery, we sure traveled a lot of mile, spiraling around that mountain to the top.

99% of all burial grounds there were on high hills or the top of the mountains. Well, they are not safe now. The bulldozer is the culprit. If they want to build a road, whatever is in the way-too bad.

In the in-between hills, where branches or creeks ran, houses were built along them. Now all the creeks and branches are dry. Shocking. They cut away more of the hill/mountain side, made the area larger for building. Saw some up Henderson Branch, built in the old [stream], where the branch once flowed full of water. I bet there are no dug wells anymore, all drilled and deep too. .

Havenât done too bad this week, raked a billion leaves off the lawn, tidied my daughterâs apartment. She works long hours, and I often go over, clean her apartment, wash a gob lob of dirty dishes [at 85 , years old]. Our Indian summer came to a halt, heavy frost last night. Froze some ice. This climate is humid. Summer the sweat saturates, and winter is a damp cold, penetrates the bone marrow. The old saying, "not fit for man nor beast," is my opinion of this section of Indiana.

When our daughter was small, we took my parents down to Carter Co., KY. My husband had never been there. We drove around looking and enjoying the landscape. Dad knew every inch of the country. One day Marjorie said to my Dad, "Grandpa, did Daniel Boone run the Indians out of this place?" He said, "Yes, I guess he did Sister (we called Marj Sister). She was so fed up with nothing but the country and mountains, she told her Dad to "give the place back to the Indians, and letâs go back home."

Now since she is older and goes and sees the country, she loves it down there. Time changes all things, including people.

Why donât you ask everyone who is a Jessee descendant to do research where ever they might be, and going. Send in the names and telephone numbers from the directories, newspaper items, any obituary, where ever found. Wherever and whenever they see the name Jessee, stop, look, listen. If traveling, keep on the look out. And if a few spare hours, and a library is near, see what they have to offer. The Tackett Organization is past 30 years plus old, and all their members are on the look out, where ever they are, for Tackett. Send it in.

The President, now a retired high school teacher, has a will that says all the collection will be shipped to the college in Pikeville, KY. That is the area where they began to settle, and many still live in the area. They [the Tackett family organization] have a national reunion in Pike Co., KY, every July.

It takes more than one person to do it all. One has to have helpers in the area where the Reunion is held. Those attending can expect to give in to the offering box, free will offering for the coming year. Got to pay the piper you know. That is a good place to pay the dues to the organization, too. It canât run on air. .

This morning, a little ditty that my grandpa made up and sang to us grand kids. We always had music and singing, which

I look back on with love and fond memories.

*Come all you Kentucky girls,
and listen to my noise,
donât you marry those West Virginia boys,
for if you do, all your potion, it will be,
corn bread and butter milk, all you will see.*

*I had a little cow, and I milked her in a gourd,
set it in the corner, covered it with a board,
some got a little, some got none, and
thatâs the way the West Virginia folks all run, thatâs the way the West Virginia all run.*

We loved to sing about ole Dan Tucker. We were a bunch of happy grand children, when we were with our grandparents. Kids now days are missing so much. There was never dissension, or any jealousy among the grand children. We grew up happy and loving everyone. The good old days were hard, but everyone was so busy, and always loving and kind.

PS: Going "west" back in the 17 and 1800s didnât mean west as we mean it today. Just another county over in the rugged country was a long way west. My gr. Grandparents Moses and Rhodisa Osborn Tackett, left Pike Co., KY, saying they were going west. Her kinfolks never heard from her again. Evidently some of the Tacketts knew [where they were] for they stopped and spent some time with them in another county. Eventually Moses and Dicy arrived up in Carter Co., where his older brother had "migrated" to, along with his in-laws. Rhodisaâs people never hearing thought surely something terrible happened to them. Maybe Indians did away with them. 100 years later, one of the Tacket Osborn kin, went up the border of KY and VA and looking for info in the counties, and to his amazement found in land and court records Moses and his family.

VIII. Frances Jessee Stone

Frances Jessee (1789-1860) married **William Stone** (1789-1860), son of **Jeremiah Stone**. They had ten children and moved to Missouri.

While I have a scant amount of descendantsâ information, I do not correspond with any descendant of Frances Jessee Stone. This is a family that needs much research.

IX. Sarah Jessee Vermillion

Sarah "Sallie" Jessee (1790-1851) married **Wilson Vermillion**, son of **Jessee Vermillion, Sr.** and **Mary "Polly" Scott**. They had three children.

Jack Hockett, of St. Davidâs Place, PA is a descendant and the main contributor to research on this branch of the family. His work has appeared in previous issues of this newsletter, and in several significant genealogy publications. He has been collaborating for a number of years with **Kathyrn Burke Greever** and **Imogene Burke Verbal** on genealogy

research, which has greatly benefited the Jessee family. Please see the discussion under Rebecca Jessee Burk below.

Kathryn Greever, recently provided me descendants' information for **Elihu Vermillion** who married **Eliza Browning**, the Brownings being the main subject of their research. Elihu Vermillion is the son of Sarah "Sallie" Jessee and Wilson Vermillion. Heretofore I had no descendants information for Elihu and Eliza.

X. Boedicia "Dicey" Jessee Gose

Boedicia "Dicy" Jessee married **Stephen Gose Jr.** (1792-bef. 1842), son of **Stephen Gose** and **Barbara Catron Gose**. They had eight children. This family moved to Iowa.

Margaret Ann "Mickey" Burnett Kearbey is the first descendant of Dicey Jessee Gose to correspond with me, and she provided information regarding her Gose and Jessee Family roots. She shared a manuscript named *A Gaggle of Gose* which reflects years of research and details the descendants of Stephen Gose I, who was born in Germany in 1719, and founded the GOSE family of Russell Co., Virginia.

She provided details on her pedigree. She is the daughter of **Charles Norman Burnett** and **Margaret Elizabeth Gose**, the d. of **Charles Stephen Gose**, s. of **Thomas Jefferson Gose**, s. of **Stephen Yancey Gose**, s. of Stephen Gose III and Dicey Jessee.

Mickey writes, "I read where the Jessee family is quite musical. It must have been passed on as my Grandfather, Charles Stephen Gose, was very musical, as was my Mom, me, and my four children. I recorded two albums with my youngest daughter Casey."

Mickey and her family lived in Nashville for several years, where she got to sing and work with Merle Haggard, Grandpa Jones, Kitty Wells, Ferlin Husky, and record demos for Cliffie Stone and his son Steve. They now live in Idaho. She was kind enough to share with me their CD, *You Better Call Home*, from Broadland International Records, a collection of country music, including original songs. Mickey said, "Hope you like this, as I said before, Iâm an olâ country girl. Casey is my baby daughter." I did and recommend it.

XI. James Jessee

James Jessee (1794-aft 1846) married **Jane Burk** (1795-aft.1846), d. of **Fleming Burk, Sr.** and **Rebecca Miller**. They had four children.

Please see the discussion under Rebecca Jessee Burk below. Kathryn Greever promises to share the fruits of their research regarding the descendants of James and Jane Burk Jessee soon. They believe they have identified one of the missing daughters of James and Jane Jessee, too.

Teresa A. Schwager recently provided (11/23/1998, pndragon@netnitco.net) several more generations of descendants of **Fleming Burke Jessee**, son of James Jessee, through his daughter, her gg-grandmother, Margaret F. Jessee who married John S. Stanley. I immediately shared this information with Kathryn Greever and Co., who got some new information.

XII. Rebecca Jessee Burk

Rebecca Jessee (1796-1860) married **William Burk** (1797-1850), son of **Fleming Burk, Sr.** and **Rebecca Miller**. They had ten children.

Kathryn Burke Greever, Jack Hockett, and Imogene Burke Verbal have made a major contribution to our efforts with years of collaborative research and imminent publication of an exhaustive genealogy work, *Some Descendants of John Burk, 1656-1699, Middlesex Co., Virginia*. It details, among many others, the descendants of Fleming Burk, Sr. Four of his children married Jessees, two children and two grandchildren of John and Frankey Lea Jessee. Jane Burk married James Jessee, William Burk married Rebecca Jessee, Fleming Burk, Jr. married Nancy Ann Jessee, daughter of David Jessee, and Robert Burk married Anna Gose, daughter of Elizabeth Jessee and George Gose. They have added important information for each of these Jessee lines. Their notations and documentation of sources is tremendous. A simply great effort.

This typed manuscript, a copy of which Kathryn kindly shared with me, includes well over 1000 descendants of Rebecca Jessee and William Burk. None of this material has been keyed into a genealogy database program of any kind. It is a daunting chore, and more than this editor can do between now and next Christmas. We need help! Following their publication, which they hope will be this year, I would like to work with any volunteers who would be willing to help key this information into an appropriate genealogy database.

Kathryn's letter follows. She also asks for some help with the remaining research problems.

November 5, 1998

Dear Jim,

Here is what Jack Hockett, Imogene Burke Verbal, and I have on William Burk and Rebecca Jessee. We still have a few holes, few, if any, of which we will be able to fill. Think we will be able to do more on the McCracken part, so it's not listed in our research gaps. Maybe you'll take a look at them and see if any fit some of our "floating" Jessees whose ancestors have not been identified. [I have attached their "research gaps" and ask that we help Kathryn, Jack and Imogene with them--Ed.]

Since we are planning to publish, please do not share this material; particularly, we wouldn't want this to hit the Internet any time soon. I know eventually it will be subject to the Internet; however, request that information on living persons be left out. We expect that you will put it in your database for reference for individual descendant searches. [I will wait until they have published before even keying in this data, and will take care to follow their restrictions. However, Kathryn made it clear she wants to help descendants who are seeking information.]

Jack found and together we decided that his find related to one of the missing daughters of James Jessee and Jane Burk. We're confident, but need a little more proof. The masterful Iris Hall is working on it since it seems that the daughter of this previously unknown daughter married into Iris's Stinson line. Have finished Fleming Burk Jessee; a little more to do on the Stinsons. Will probably not do much on the 3rd "found" child. .

Pre-1900 Research Gaps

1. Jennie (Burke) and Edward Stinson's 4th daughter. Mary J. Stinson, married Archer F. Jessee in Jan. 1880. They are on the 1880 Russel Co., VA census, but not otherwise traced.
2. William and Rebecca (Jessee) Burke's 3rd child, Mary M., married John T. Jessee. Their son, Isaac, who married Martha Ousely, died in 1887. Their three oldest children are not seen after the 1880 Claiborne Co., TN census: Samuel T. Jessee, born c 1869; William G. Jessee, born c 1872; and Charles H. Jessee, born c 1875.
3. Mary M. Burke and John T. Jessee's 5th child, Wilburn G. Jessee, died Oct. 1, 1895. We have not been able to determine the names of his children by Sarah Lynch.
4. Mary M. Burke and John T. Jessee's 9th child, Susan E., married in 1880, John T. Carter. We have not found them after the 1880 Claiborne Co., TN census.
5. Jennie Burk and Edward Stinson's grandson, Thomas Remley Stinson, had a son, Henry Stinson, born c 1885, who is not seen on the 1900 census. Have been unable to trace this Henry.
6. Frances Burk who married Wm. Patton Necessary: Their son Wm. H. married Martha Moore and their first child was Mary J., 11/12 on the 1880 Washington Co., VA census. She has not been traced and may have died early.
7. William and Rebecca (Jessee) Burke's 8th child, Isaiah Jessee Burke. There are gaps with three of his children: 1st, Susan who married James Meek has not been traced to the 1880 census or beyond. 2nd, Margaret Burk who married John Wm. Tilley, has not been traced to the 1880 census and beyond. 3rd, Florence M. married John D. Mallen, not traced on the census although she is reported to have died in 1886, probably of childbirth, probably in UT.

XIII. Jane Jessee Fuller

Jane Jessee (1797-1869) married **Henry Fuller** (1792-1872), son of **Abraham Fuller** and **Mary Sargent**. They had ten children. This family moved to Illinois.

While I have a scant amount of descendants's information, I do not correspond with any descendant of Jane Jessee Fuller. This is a family that needs much research.

XIV. George Lea Jessee

George Lea Jessee (1798-1882) married **Elizabeth "Betsy" Counts** (1799-1880), da. of **John Counts, Jr.** and **Margaret "Peggy" Kelly**. They had fourteen children.

Many George Lea Jessee descendants are subscribers and have contributed much information to this database. It is one of our best researched and recorded branches of the family.

XV. Martin Jessee

Martin Jessee (1801-1879) married first **Virginia Jane Price** (1801-1853), da. of David and June Price; and they had eleven children. He married second **Mary Jane Darnold** (1834-1907) and they had seven children.

Kathryn Greever, always mindful of the cause, provided me materials with information regarding Martin Van Buren Jessee and his descendants. These will be incorporated into the database and made available to those requesting more information.

I received this from a descendant. Since itâs not a line Iâm working on, I thought you might like to have it. These were Scott Co. Jessees with some being in Wise Co., VA in 1900.

Who is Daniel E. Jessee?

In the last newsletter we asked: Who Is Daniel E. Jessee, Famous Sportman and Author, who was born in Carter Co., KY, son of James and Virginia Meade Jessee?

Tom Rudder may have solved the mystery with the following data and speculation. He provided 1850-1900 Census data for Floyd and Carter Co., KY, which support the following pedigree for Daniel E. Jessee. It also illustrates how tentative and contradictory our data is regarding alleged descendants of John Jessee III, the son of John Jessee Jr., first son of John and Frankey Lea Jessee, and a comparatively close kin to this editor. Your help with this knotty problem is welcome.

Descendants of John JESSEE III

First Generation

1. John JESSEE III-199 was born about 1803/1805 in Russell Co., VA. He died after 1880 in Floyd Co., KY.

Source: material provided by Vivian Bales (Jan 1998) provides evidence of a John and Mary Jessee family in the 1850 and 1870 Floyd Co. Census, with the children and ages shown.

Source: material provided by Tom Rudder (Oct 23, 1998) also states that John Jessee III, son of John Jr. moved to Floyd Co., KY about 1842, and he provides Census Data (1850 Floyd Co., KY 1880 Floyd Co., KY, and 1900 Carter Co., KY) indicating a marriage to Mary, their children and grandchildren. Tom speculates that this is the pedigree for Daniel E. Jessee famous Sportsman and Author. He believes that the Joseph Jessee also listed in the 1850 Floyd Co., KY Census is not their son, but a relative.

Problem: material provided by Kimberly Cook, based on 1850 KY Census indicates that a John Jessee, her ancestor, moved with wife Mary from VA to KY with his family about 1842. That this John Jessee III, is the same John Jessee of Floyd Co. KY, ancestor of Kim Cook, is a speculation of Jim Jessee, based on the coincidence of birth dates (1805) and the occurrence of the name William in the John Jessee family. This may be an error. Another option to pursue for Kim is John Trigg Jessee, RIN 8639, who also had a wife Mary Burk, and some of their children's names are the same.

Correspondence

The following is a portion of the many letters and e-mails I am fortunate to receive. These give color to our work, answer questions, provide new information, problems, corrections, or updates, and ask new questions.

Iris Lambert Hall has been among my most faithful helpers, always providing new bits of information, answers to inquiries, and corrections where needed. I am very grateful for the many hours she devotes to this work. Here is her response to the last newsletter.

August 6, 1998

Dear Jim

I have been checking over Number 13 of the newsletter from time to time and decided while I had a few minutes tonight, would write you with a few thoughts. Our son is here from California and what with my 73rd birthday coming up in a few days and Marion's and my 50th wedding anniversary coming up tomorrow, he has been busy with Linda planning "stuff". I would just as soon have some cake and ice cream out back on the patio but don't think I am going to get by with that. [And congratulations on both fine achievements÷Ed.]

In my usual "style" (if you could call it even that), I will start off with my notes as I read the newsletter and hopefully you will be able to find something useful.

Page 7: my reference to page 168 of Pioneer Recollections the newsletter states, "Priscilla Harding, dau. of Aaron Gose, son of Elizabeth Jessee and John Jessee." It should have read "son of Elizabeth Jessee and George Gose" or "Elizabeth, daughter of John Jessee."

A George L. Jessee, born 1827, Russell Co. Va., was married to an Elizabeth (Eliza)-they were in Russell Co. in 1850 census and in Carter Co. Kentucky in 1860 census. I have never really found proof just which George Lee he was, who his parents were. One of their children was James R. Jessee, born 1848/49 who, on Feb. 9, 1868 in Carter Co., Ky. married Sarah Elizabeth Erwin, dau of Thomas Jefferson and Martha (Stamper) Erwin. (See page 6, this is only one of those listed I have any information on.)

In regards to the pedigree Chart of Howard G. Jessee line, No. 4, George Lee Jessee: I found him born Sept. 16, 1853 in Washington Co., Va. Bk. 1, p. 7 No. 10. He married Dorthula Mandora Dickenson.

In regard to the Cuntze charts, P. 4, 37M: Margaret (Peggy) Kelly, ma. John Counts, Jr. Margaret dau. of John (?). She was a sister of my Rev. Edward Kelly. I (just personally, no real proof) have always thought they were children of an

Amey Kelly who appeared near Edward and some of his older brothers on Shenandoah Co. tax lists. Edward had only one daughter, and he named her Amy. However, I have no confirmation of this possibility at all, and have never been able to find even a hint of who Edward and Margaret's father was. He named his first son Michael and then John, William and Peter, plus Amy.

Page 19, Pedigree Chart of Dewey Alderson Jessee: I see at No. 32/33 our John Jessee's parents are shown as Henry and Elizabeth, and Frankie Lea Jessee's parents are shown as William and Mary (Archer?) Lea. Is this just speculation or is there something definite on that now? [IMPORTANT: Iris is correct to point out that this is speculation, not proven, as discussed in the source notes for John and Frankey. All readers beware÷Ed.]

Page 22, aren't the names of the parents of Frederick Winfred Jessee and Nancy Jessee reversed in first paragraph? I have Nancy Jessee's parents as John Counts and Margaret Cross Jessee and Thomas J. Jessee and Sarah Browning Jessee as parents of Frederick W. [Iris is correct÷Ed.]

Dear Mr. Jessee

I have just a little information to go along with what Tom Rudder had in the newsletter for **Phillip and Gabriel Jessee**.

Tom had that Phillip's daughter Mary was born 1802 in Botetourt Co., (1850 RC Census). I have a photocopy of the original Bureau of Vital Statistics death record, located in Richmond, VA, of Mary's death. Her name is listed as SmcKinney, Mary (Atkins's Book of RC Deaths page 68 lists her as Mary Sue Kinney--I disagree, looking at the photocopy), white, female, death date of Oct 20, 1887, at New Garden, of old age, at the age of 94 (which would place her born abt 1793). Name of Parents as Phil and Rachel Jessee, she was born in Russell Co. (by ditto marks down a whole page, but according to the 1850 Census, this should be Botetourt Co.). Her occupation was housekeeper, and the consort of S mcKinney.

This is my interpretation of this record. I think she is **Mary S. McKinney** and has been married to a S. McKinney. I think it is Phillip's daughter. Probably the age is off and the 1850 census is more correct for age and place of birth. The whole page has ditto marks for place of birth being Russell Co. I will try to do some more looking in the 1860, 70, and 80 census to see what age it gives for her. ·

Nancy,

As you can see, I have not corrected your name but will later. I have some items to share with you and hopefully Marguerite can verify. In the 1860 Census, it shows the following:

James Fields of Elizabethtown, Ky. (Hardin County) was 43 years, married to Mary Fields, occupation-Farmer, property value 300, Children-Elizabeth 14, William 12, John 10, Laura 8, and Infant 2 months.

Laura Fields married **Harry D. Williams**. I do not know when. She lived in Edinburg, Ind., Logansport, Ind. and moved to Indianapolis, Ind. She owned a house on Day Street in Broad Ripple which was about a half block from where David and I were raised. Harry and Laura had two children, **Ivy and William U. Williams**. William moved to Jackson, Michigan and also became a Printer. Harry introduced Ivy to **David Augustus Jessee** who was a printer and worked with Harry. They both worked for the Indianapolis News. Note, this was not all in the 1860 Census.

To my knowledge, David had two sisters named Mary and Nillie. In the 1890 Census, I find **Mary Jessee 13, Nillie**

Jessee 26, David Jessee 17, located at 725 North Illinois Street Indianapolis, Indiana. I also find **Nannie Jessee** enumerated with Margaret Simpson (roomer) at this address, age 25. In fact, they were all shown as being enumerated with Margaret Simpson. At 701 North Illinois Street was **Ella Jessee**, age 31. I have no idea who this is.

In the 1920 Census, you find David A. Jessee married to Iva (y) at 1328 North Illinois Street with their children Velma 16, Harry 13, William 9, Margaret 8, Marella 3yrs. 9mos. Also shown is Nellie Loyd (Colored), and Roomers Harrison Barton 29, Marion Barton 19 and Alfred Barton 3yrs.2mos.

At some point, David Jessee and his sisters lived in Terre Haute, Indiana. I think with an Aunt. I have a record of David in the First grade. I also have a record of **Samuel H. Jessee** married to **Julia O'Herron** that shows **Nane Bell Jessee** and Mary Jessee born or baptised at St. Joseph's Church in Terre Haute, Indiana in 1873 and 1885. A **Julia Jessey(e)** died 3/19/1890 and was buried at St. Joseph's at age 36.

Margaret Simpson, who was at 725 North Illinois Street, died 3/9/1908. I think she was possibly the sister of Julia O'Herron or Samuel Jessee and was taking care of David A. Jessee and his sisters.

This is a few items to think about with your Mother. We are all connected to this in some matter.

Bill [William H. Jessee]

Based on the above information, and additional information provided by Bill, I have constructed the following descendants chart. We ask your help in connecting Samuel and David A. Jessee to the greater Jesse(e) family, and in documenting, enlarging, and correcting the data as I have recorded it.

Virginia Bennett provided me materials that included pages from *Some Early Barbadian History÷Memoirs of the First Settlement of the Island of Barbados*, by Major John Scott, written in 1677. It includes stories and references to individuals by the names of **Philip Lea**, **Charles Leigh**, **John Leigh**, and **Sir Olaf Leigh**, all among the earliest settlers of Barbados, 1604-1620. Besides fascinating reading, perhaps there is a clue to Frankey Lea's family origins here.

She also calls attention to a publication by and available from **Michael A. Dye** (207 Deersadow Rd., Maineville, OH 45039; 513-677-8791; m.a.d.man@worldnet.att.net).

It is his extractions of the *Russell County Virginia Marriage Register #2*, Volume 2, 1871-1885 (Also including the lost marriage records, 1848-1853). Michael extended the marriage record information with additional research, providing us a valuable new resource for many families whose origins are in Russell Co., VA. We will have more on the tremendous contributions of Michael A. Dye to Russell Co. genealogy in the next newsletter.

Our Maryland Heritage, Book 12: Browning Families, by William N. Hurley:

"[The Browning Family]...primarily of Frederick and Montgomery counties, Maryland, and including some members of the family found in other regions, The roots of the Browning family are in Great Britain, with arms borne by Browning of Cambridge and Browning of Cowley as well as three other houses. Thomas Browning was the first of his family to travel to the colonies in the 1659, arriving first in Rappahannock County, Virginia, and returning to England for his family in 1656. The family relocated to Maryland from Rappahannock in 1665, many of the children settled in Cecil and Kent Counties. Thomas and his wife Hester returned to Bristol in 1674, both dying soon after but having established the Browning name in Maryland.

·[the book] moves into early records of the Browning family, beginning with Thomas Browning and concentrating on the descendants of his grandson Francis Browning, born c. 1672 to John and Elizabeth. Two chapters are devoted to sons of Francis, namely Edward Browning Jr., and William Browning. ·A bibliography of relevant sources is included as well as a fullname index. 1998, 571 pp. Bib., paper, \$44, #H863"

John David Jessee, of Stone Mountain, GA, writes, 6/22/98 (jjessee@concentric.net) responded to an e-mail inquiry of **Linda Kiser** (kisermus@alaska.net) and copied me.

Hi Cousins,

My name is John David Jessee, born in Russell County, VA in 1948 to **Grady Lee** and **Sally Mattie Cook Jessee**. I currently live in Stone Mountain, GA and visit my parents in Lebanon, VA about 8-10 times each year. My father was born in 1896 to **Charlie Benson** and **Jean Annie (Wallace) Jessee** near Cleveland and Nashâs Ford, VA. Grady Lee (my father) is currently 102 years of age and in good health [most probably our oldest living Jessee-Ed.]. He is a wealth of information, however, most cannot be documented.

According to my fatherâs verbal account, his grandfatherâs name is **John "Bull" Jessee** of the Cleveland, VA area. John Bull served the Confederacy during the conflict of the 1860âs and relates a story of sleeping in the open under 10 inches of snow yet still remaining warm. John Bull died of natural causes in the early 1900s. The names George Jessee and Frankie Lea have also been mentioned by my father as possible previous generations. I can only speculate about this possibility since my father seems somewhat unsure. [John "Bull" Jessee is **John Counts Jessee**, son of **George Lea Jessee**, s. of John and Frankey Lea Jessee-Ed.]

I would like to conduct a search of grave sites prior to my grandfather. The Russell County Court House burned and had some records destroyed in the early 1900s, I am told, so finding information there might be difficult but I would like to pursue that idea. Seems that family Bibles are the best source of information in the area which might lead to family cemeteries.

Please open the attachment and find a WWI picture of my father Grady Lee Jessee. [Using your browser go to <http://www.roanoke.com/roatimes/ww1/jessee.html>, to find more information on Grady Lee Jessee and both see and hear an interview with him.] He is an inspiration to everyone who knows him and has appeared on local TV because of his service in WWI and his alertness and sense of humor at age 102. We celebrated his birthday this June and will be looking forward to the 103rd birthday celebration. I would like to make next yearâs celebration a Jessee Virginia reunion and the year 2000 celebration a national Jessee reunion to be held in the mountains of Virginia in Russell County. Let me know what you think of the idea.

[I love this idea, and welcome organizers-Ed.]

I have a niece and nephew in Russell County by the name of **Billie Sue Kiser** and **Milton "Mitt" Kiser**. Could there be some relation to your family? .

"I have no idea which Jessee family my husband is descended from. The only information I have is that of **Clarence Jessee** who was killed in WW II, supposedly at Normandy Beach. Do you have any Clarence Jessee in your family that might fit this description?"

Donna Bogue inquired via e-mail, 12/9/1998 (donnabogue@earthlink.net), regarding her pedigree as follows.

Jim,

I see you have some information on the Jessee family. I am looking for my family and I have very little information. Can you take a look at what I got and let me know if any of these people fit with the information you have?

I am searching for two sisters (parents unknown, so far) believed to be from Russell Co., VA. They were **Martha Castle** [who married **Jefferson Davis Meade**] and **Sallie Castle** [who married **Greely Jessee**]. I am looking for their husband's families.

Donna provided descendants information for the sisters, down to her grandmother, **Lillian Lucille "Lucy" Meade**, who married **Henry Aldridge**, and I was quickly able to place them all within the Jessee and several other Russell County families. The result is one of the most amazing pedigrees that I have encountered so far. Donna is descended from three of John and Frankey Lea Jessee's children, **Mary "Polly" Jessee Kiser**, **George Lea Jessee**, and **Martin Jessee**, and she is also my wife's cousin via the Counts family connection I shared in prior newsletters. She is a cousin so many ways to my kids, it gets down right ridiculous! I will share Grandma Lucy's pedigree chart and family photos provided by Donna on the following pages.

As always I welcome corrections, extensions, and documentation of all information provided.

The Banner book by William Perry Banner of Ashville, NC, shows the following. Jacob Banner, son of John Banner Sr., and Catherine Rackenpough, married Phebe Finney. Their son John Wesley Banner (b. 6-12-1820) married Martha Broadwaters in Texas. Their children were Thomas Jefferson (b. 12-11-1844) m. Betty Berry. And a daughter Mary Jane ? (it looks like it might be a misplaced name, birth date in different era). The Charles Banner who married Margaret Ann Gose was the son of John Banner the third. Margaret was the daughter of Stephen Gose, the son of Christopher

Gose. They had two children: William Gose Banner, and John Banner the fourth.

Mary Lee seems to imply that the book by J. C. Banner has the names of the parents of John Banner Sr. and Catherine in it. Can we get that information?

This is all I know about her, except that she hit a soldier over the head with a bag of socks when he tried to get her to dance in the street after the war. I have no pictures and no other names to link her to. If you have any other information I would really appreciate it. I can get you names of her recent descendants if that would be of any help. She described Howard's struggle with his health his last months, and that his family had spent as much time with him as was possible. She assured us that all of Howard's genealogy materials were packed carefully and have been sent to Howard's son, Michael, as Howard wanted. She indicated the family very much appreciated the memorial article and the donations in Howard's name to the Russell County Library, Family History Center.

Thelma and Carolyn Jessee Cooper sent Christmas greetings and Carolyn wrote, "of course we will be missing Howard this holiday season, but at least don't have to worry about him being sick and spending Christmas alone. God knows best!"

About the Database

Putting "our" Jessee Family Database on-line is a humbling responsibility. I have received information from hundreds of people over thirty years that I carefully, and sometimes not so carefully, recorded in this database. My crediting of sources and documentation of information goes from none to professional as I learned to be a genealogist over this great length of time. Providing credits and references to sources improved over time, but it is most imperfect, and in some cases may approach a breach of intellectual integrity. I apologize.

Much of the database information comes from others without any independent validation or knowledge of their care in collecting, recording, and documenting their data. Much came to me long before there was an Internet and public access to such data. On the web site I provide a disclaimer, explaining that anyone who uses it must beware, and accept information with caution. However, I am concerned about the possible violation of trust and confidentiality. I don't want to take credit for the work of others. Please inform me of needed credits and source documentation. If you find information in the database that you want altered or removed, please inform me.
